We now expect to go up the weekend of the 27th & 28th so we can see Daddy again before he leaves for "Le Far-West" as the French say.

I'm so glad you have the coffee dispenser. Did I ask you for a silver tea pot only? If I asked you for a creamer & sugar bowl also, please ignore the request, because I don't need the two accessories. Just the tea pot, which being silver would go with my cups & saucers & sugar bowl, etc. The two trays would be lovely, mamma, but aren't you giving up something you

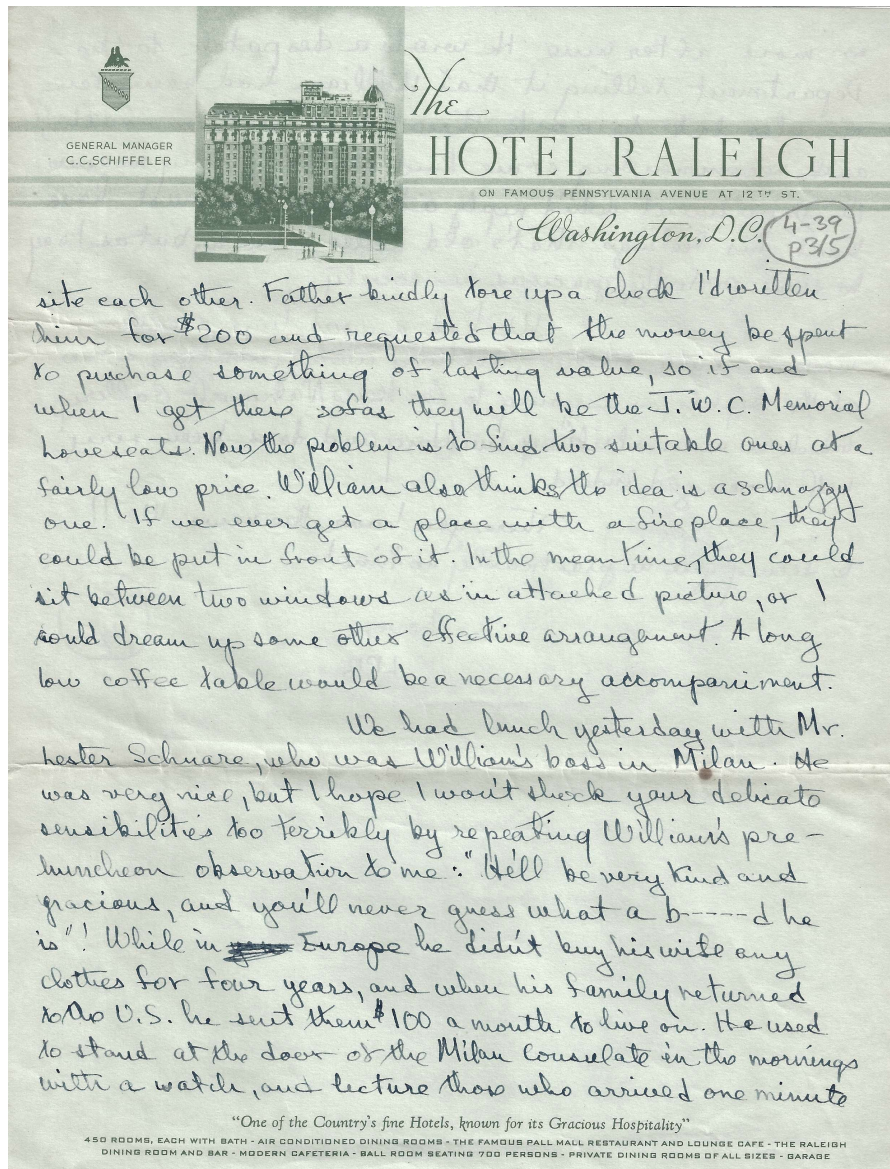
