Dear Poppa,

I have already written this letter and sent it by clipper, but to make assurance doubly sure I shall send this copy by Mrs. Kay whose son is with the A.P. and who is sailing on the <u>Washington</u>.

It's about our pay: we want to send the salary part of it, \$77.20 to the U.S. 1) because we get a better exchange 2) because we want to pay off a \$60 debt 3) because we want, after the debt is paid, to save money over there. There is an arrangement by which the State dept pays individuals or banks in the U.S. all or part of Foreign service salaries. We have arranged to send our salary, but not the rent allowance, to you. Jones wanted to send it to his mother, but I thought about that \$150 in the

bank that you said was in my name, and decided it would be a good thing to make it the nucleus of a bank account. The hitch is that it would be a great deal of trouble for you, as there would be many letters to mail if the bank wouldn't do it themselves. This is our scheme: To send \$10 monthly to Mrs. Jones, Sr. so she can pay off the debt. To send the rest, minus \$.63, to us in two installments a month, on the 1st and 15th, in francs. The \$.63 is for stamps to Mrs. Jones and us by clipper. That makes us getting about 1750 francs each two weeks, plus the rent allowance, and also we get used to not having that \$10 monthly, so that later we can save it in the bank. If the bank would do all the details for a sum, the money would naturally come from our account.

The first payment will come to you late in July, and it will be for the month of June. A delay due to the clerical details. We don't know when the money for July will come, but after the first time there should not be great delays. Unfortunately we will need money before the 1st of August, or whenever it is that the money for June will come back to us. So our plan is to take some of the \$150, & deposit the June-coming-in-July money when it arrives. So would you please send \$66.57 to us pretty soon quick, or if you have plenty of leisure & just love that sort of thing, send it in two installments, so as to give us the advantage of a probable fall in the franc. Poor daddy! You'll have to quit the AT&T and work for us!

without Jimmie, I will receive \$80 monthly, in addition to the usual salary & rent allowance paid to James, and I will be given the last of 1st class transportation anywhere.

The situation looks about as black as possible, although Paris looks as nice & calm as ever. Our only worry is finding someplace to live when & if we leave Paris, because the south west of France is overcrowded. I should like to go to Spain (news!) if I could get back into France. It might be possible, my darling says.

What gets me clamed is the terrible number of horrible things I could tell you if I had words to express them. I don't, but oh daddy please get out your propaganda machine & set it working to keep the U.S. out of this dirty mess. There's no good in it, on either side.
