Dear William:

It was a great relief to receive your cable with the news of Betty Lou's return home. The turn of events have evidently been serious enough to penetrate her consciousness and not hearing from us makes her realize what might happen in the future. I am enclosing a note to her which I hope you will send her so that she may get it before leaving for home. Also a page from her letter which arrived yesterday and being an impartial observer you may be able to help her with her problem – and I know that it does worry her unduly. After all, it is unfortunate to take out one's hate and spite on children who are, in a way, the innocent victims

of circumstance.

Everything here is progressing as usual. Janie is in the "throes" of another wedding, exams, etc., while your dad and I pursue the even tenor of our Mays. Last Sunday afternoon we stirred up our unused muscles – not to mention rheumatism – by planting some 300 glad[iolus]-bulbs in the garden at your farm. We are hoping to go to Havana to the International Rotary Convention, sailing on the "Kungsholm" from New York on June 6, and remaining in Havana for five days. We both look forward to having a really wonderful time – and we shall –.

I do thank you from the bottom of my heart for all your kindness to Betty and I know that you will see that she is safely aboard the "Washington" – and be sure to warn her to be "<u>careful</u>" – you can you know. I speak from experience! Take good care of your own self and we anticipate a letter from you in the near future.
