May 29, 1941 –

Your letter of May 10 reached us & was very much appreciated and enjoyed.

We hope that you may be privileged to make the anticipated trip to Rome this weekend.

We have some very lovely flowers to take to the cemetery this evening and then we are going to the country. We will spend the night in Coshocton & then to Hanover for tomorrow. The place in Hanover looks very beautiful and the pines

are especially lovely – we hope to spend a lot of time there this summer. It is only 10 or 15 minutes into town & Laurence can easily commute and the nights are heavenly quiet and cool. Wish you could be here.

The Mitchell's, Ned Wrights & Jones were coming there for a picnic tomorrow but Mrs. Ned fell Mon. morning breaking her hip. She had 3 blood transfusions within 24 hours & it is still very low. The process of setting the hip required 3 hours under ether. We are looking for her recovery. She & Ned led

such a lovely life <u>together</u>. They are really a couple that restore one's belief in marriage and that essential ingredient of "togetherness".

Mary & Leonard and your grandfather are coming to Columbus & Newark for the weekend. We hope that they will have dinner with us on Saturday night. They intend to leave for home early on Sunday. Your grandfather has not had his usual visit this spring. Leonard is working as well as Mary and it seems he is needed there. It is a wonderful thing for an elderly person to feel that they are needed.

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We went to Coshocton last Monday afternoon to Gorley Gray's funeral. I can imagine from all I hear that Gorley was a sore trial to his father, Cousin. Thad Montgomery took us up to the cemetery and out to see the lovely new home of his son Edward. The view is superb. The house is on a hill – some 1200 feet above sea level & commands an extensive & glorious outlook over the river valley.

Enclosed are couple of clippings. We look forward to your next letter and with the hope that you are well and happy as well as love from us all – Sarah

Crash Near Granville Kills Young Coshocton Executive

Charles R. Frederickson, Jr., Graduate Of Denison And Son Of Coshocton Manufacturer Dies En Route To Hospital

Charles R. Frederickson, Jr., 28-year-old assistant secretary-treasurer of the Coshocton Art Works, was fatally injured at 11:20 p. m. Thursday when his automobile collided on the slippery pavement in Route 16 between Granville and Dugway with another machine driven by C. L. Nickolia, Columbus.

A Criss Brothers ambulance rushed Frederickson, Nickolia and his wife to the Newark City hospital. The former was pronounced dead upon arrival. His skull had been fractured and he was badly cut about the head and upper portion of his body.

Mr. Nickolia suffered lacerations of the lower lip and neck, and a fractured kneecap. His condition today was reported as "fairly good". Mrs. Nickolia sustained excessive lacerations of the face and legs, and was reported today in "just fair" condition,

The accident was investigated by Sheriff Bill McElroy and deputies, and State Highway Patrolman R. P. Shaw. The authorities disclosed that their investigation revealed that Frederickson had been traveling east, the Nickolias, west. The front of the Nickolia car hit the middle of the other machine, indicating that the Frederickson automobile had skidded on the wet pavement into the path of the car coming from the opposite direction.

The death of Mr. Frederickson marks Licking county's ninth traffic fatality this year.

The deceased was the son of Charles Frederickson, Sr., Ohio's second choice "Favorite Son" in the recent Republican national convention. He was graduated from Denison university in the class of '35, and was president of Beta Theta Pi fraternity there in his senior year. He was a member of the Denison golf team for three years.

Surviving are his wife, Carolyn Ashley Frederickson and two small children, Charles R. Frederickson, III, age four, and daughter Jo Burr, age two, and Charles Frederickson, Sr., the father. The body was taken to Coshocton from the Criss Brothers Funeral home early this morning.

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
